An Easter Reflection -

The Good News We all Want To Hear

There is much happening in the Church right now, both universally and locally. Speculation runs high, as the media goes bonkers on trying to figure out who Pope Leo XIV "really" is and how he will govern and lead the Catholic Church and become a "voice" to the world. Not only the press though are curious about what lies ahead for the "new" church led by Pope Leo. We too in a world and nation torn by much division wonder if Pope Leo will have an impact on making "all things new." He speaks eloquently of the need for peace and unity, and we long for these to be restored to our planet, countries and churches.

These last few weeks of the Easter season are also when parishes gather children around their altars to receive their first taste of the Eucharist - the Body and Blood of Christ. Many parishes acknowledge how the gifts of the Holy Spirit fill the lives of the many young teens receiving Confirmation in our diocese. Finally, now that Lent has passed, parishes welcome many adults into the Church at the Easter Vigil and throughout our Eastertime many babies are also bathed in the life-giving waters of Baptism.



We are quite aware that the nurturing of the faith of these many new disciples of Jesus, does not lie solely in the hands of anyone who ascends the throne of St. Peter. We all have essential roles in how God's name and spirit finds a home in every person. The Acts of the Apostles this Sunday points out many ways this nurturing took place then in the early Church through Paul, Barnabas and many other disciples. How they witnessed to their faith is a model to how we must also open the door to faith to others.

St. Luke tells us in Acts that we must proclaim the good news to the cities around us if we want to make "a considerable number of disciples." Without ignoring others' struggles, we must emphasize God's joy. This comes through the recognition that God dwells with the whole human race.

It was important that the early disciples "strengthened the spirits" of the people and "exhorted them to persevere." Challenging as this may be today, we too are called to this same task. As disciples we do this not for our own glory, but to enable a more hopeful community to endure.

These initial bringers of the good news did this by "appointing elders for them in the church" and helping them to encounter Christ "with prayer and fasting." Their gatherings with one another in a shared prayer helped them to hear the needs that so many longed for in a closeness to God. Their willingness to sacrifice for the poor around them helped them to let go of what held them back from service to their neighbors. These same patterns of communal prayer and sacrifice are what enable us to respond to the needs of those around us.

These early Chrisitan communities did all of this not to draw attention to themselves, but to lead each city they traveled to hear what "God had done for them" and all that was accomplished through an openness to the grace of God. It is by identifying with genuine sincerity that through our love of one another the Son of God is glorified, not ourselves.

Jesus invites us to allow "the old order to pass away" and to create in our interactions with one another "a new heaven and a new earth." This doesn't create a new commandment about loving one another, that vocation has always been there for everyone to live. What is new is that through our loving of one another, a deeper awareness grows in us, around us and through us that we are God's people. And isn't that the good news that all of us need to hear? -Fr. Michael

CEMETERY NOTES Thank you to all who care for those buried in Holy Rosary and St. Joseph's Cemeteries, both staff and the Family members of those resting from life's labors. Please be reminded - Unsettled new graves, or tilted stones can cause harm to visitors. Please work to have your family stones cared for by a professional. This is the obligation of the living members of those persons/families buried in our cemeteries. The American flags at the graves of our military are placed at the head of the grave, in line with the headstones - NOT the footstones or military markers. The same is true of flower plantings. Artificial flowers not in safe metal or stone containers become a safety issue, as do statues or other items placed that are not part of an actual permanent monument they simply are not allowed. As always, visit only during daylight hours. Do not visit before dawn or at/after dusk. Finally, please do not dump refuse, weeds, etc. at St. Joseph's Cemetery or by Holy Rosary, out of respect for the dead. Again, thank you for your cooperation and beautiful work caring for loved ones buried in our cemeteries!
